Scott Long, MSM, CD

- Twice to Afghanistan.

He is a graduate of the Canadian Forces International Command and Staff College, Toronto, Ontario. He has commanded at all of his respective rank levels and participated in high level planning, coordination and operations within NATO and the United Nations.

After 28 years in the military, Scott retired from the Regular Forces on 20 June 2014. After a weekend of much enjoyed retirement golf he joined the Government of Alberta (GOA) in his current position as the Executive Director Provincial Operations, Alberta Emergency Management Agency (AEMA).

In this role he has led the AEMA Operations team in coordinating the GOA response during the 2014 flood season, 2015 wildfire season and most notably the Fort McMurray Interface Wildfire response in May and June of 2016.
