### PROPOSED WELL SUSPENSION AND ABANDONMENT GUIDELINES AND INTERPRETATION NOTES

YELLOWKNIFE (June 6, 2016) - The Office of the Regulator of Oil and Gas Operations (OROGO) has started a public engagement process on proposed *Well Suspension and Abandonment Guidelines and Interpretation Notes* (Guidelines).

The objectives of the guidelines are to:

- Support compliance with the *Oil and Gas Drilling and Production Regulations* (OGDPR);
- Ensure good oil field practices are used to suspend and abandon wells in the Regulator's jurisdiction;
- Achieve a level of consistency with the requirements of other western Canadian regulators, where appropriate; and
- Reflect the context of oil and gas activities in the Regulator's jurisdiction, particularly:
  - The legislative framework, and
  - The remote operating environment.

#### **Quick Facts:**

- The Oil and Gas Operations Act (OGOA) came into force with devolution on April 1, 2014.
- The Regulator may issue guidelines and interpretation notes under section 18 of OGOA.
- In 2015-16, OROGO regulated thirteen well suspensions and one well abandonment.
